Gary is in the middle of which is challenging, but we'll we'll talk about that at the end of meeting. So look, I do understand, I do understand that they are

Thank you very much. Thank you. So I appreciate that very much. All right. And I just wanted to ask, everyone's had a look at the draft agenda. Are there any other items you wish to add to the agenda? No. Okay.

Vashkar Bhattacharjee

I think we need to identify some communication accessible communication channel, such as how you will communicate with each others in a more effective manner and accessible manner.

Gunela Astbrink

Yeah, I think that's a good point. And we will, we will deal with it under the SG processes under that number four agenda items. So that's, that's good. Absolutely. I will probably add an agenda item on the ISO content strategy, just to ensure we're all up to speed with what's happening there. So

then your ASAP strategy. Yeah. Can we also make sure you put in is on the registration forms. They need to add make sure that there's a line added on all when, when on all registration forms for zoom or other asking people about their accessibility needs. Yeah.

Okay. Well, we'll put that I've noted it and we'll we'll, we'll cover that under under bet agenda item on I saw content strategy. Yep, that's fine. Thank you. Alright. Okay, let's get going. Then. i The second item on the agenda is the introduction of each team member. And I did ask people if they wish to write something before the meeting, and thank you very much psychiatry for what you've written. That was really informative and there were some some great ideas. So that's something to grab hold of, and to discuss probably in the next meeting, in more detail. So I think if each of us could just force three minutes or so or less, just introduce themselves and, and that would be just just a couple of sentences about your background, but mostly most importantly, is the skills you bring to this leadership team. And any ideas you have that that we can discuss as we start working on our action plan. And so who would like to start Okay, well, look, I'll start and and I think you've, you might have read have been working in in this accessibility and disability failed and policy programs and research for the last nearly 30 years, which makes me rather old now. And, and I might well my skills I suppose, are there that I am. I've got connections within a range of Internet communities. And I have that experience to hopefully lead this group to to achieve good things in the future. And some of the ideas are basically raising awareness about accessibility across ISOC various communities, increasing training opportunities in Internet governance and digital literacy, and building leadership, building leadership, with persons with disability and animal so liaising with the existing groups of a 11, why STG and also DCad, the dynamic Coalition on accessibility and disability. So I'll just leave it there for now. And and I will go across the people I see on the on the video list here, and suoraan is the next person I see. So to her and would you like to introduce yourself base

Swaran Ravindra

so my name is foreign and a very warm welcome to everybody to you know, the future because Fiji is a we in our head, I guess. So. Yeah. I have been working for Fiji National University, which is a dual sector University in Fiji and we are the largest regional university in the in the region, and Pacific region. Um, I am my, my experience with disabilities in particular, in 2015. So I'm a technologist by profession. And I teach both Australian TAFE programs as well as industry related consultancies and research. So um, my experience with disabilities came in 2015. We do have a constitutional right for inclusive education but that being said, and for that to happen, there was a huge gap that I realized existed in the community. So in 2015, we started off an initiative where I had about 30 students with different forms of disabilities. And as much as I wanted to help, I realize there's lots of gaps, and I realized we need to have proper catalysts and that's when I started working in this area. So eventually mean after I completed my master's, which is in medical informatics purposes, I decided to take up inclusion as my topic for my PhD because I realized until and unless it's on paper, nobody takes you seriously. You cannot make recommendations to government. You cannot make you know, frameworks for adaptability. So I realize it's, it's just best to take this academically, especially because I do not have a living experience of disability I really needed to spend a lot of time in spaces where I could learn. And

that's that's how I got into ISOC and APR IGF, as well as specific IGF. And so that's just a bit about me in terms of my research. I have three main chapters. So far. The first one is on hearing impairments deaf and hearing. Sorry, I might fumble a bit because I have a 13 hour shift. So um, so yeah, I'm with my first chapter we were just trying to gauge what is the level of inclusion for persons with hearing impairments. And so we basically did a survey of 50 participants and from there, we took 20 participants, and we we gave them a low tech tool to use and we realized that if we present sign language through a low tech device, we see that there's this great accessibility, great acceptance for it. So that gave us a bit of motivation to go further. And then the second topic was in inclusive agriculture with which was by introducing agriculture 4.0 and giving it a more inclusive angle. Because in Fiji, we have one imputation happening every eight hours, and that adds to the 13.7% of our population who have disabilities, and that added to the Pacific Islands becomes 1.2 million, or perhaps more because we just counting what's on the last centers report and then there's obviously a projection as well. So from there onwards, what I eventually wanted to do, because I've had some students who had cerebral palsy, and I realized there's so much potential in them, but they're being limited because our environment is not inclusive. So I started working on terrible policy, but I haven't quite gotten there yet. Basically, what I aim to do is to create technology in inclusive technology in a way that we should not make it look like if we are doing a favor on anyone. It should look as inclusive as possible. So that's basically the angle that I've tried to utilize in my research. That inclusion should not look like it's a favor on anybody. It is a right.

Okay, and what ideas do you have any particular ideas you wish to bring to the group at this early stage? If you don't, that's fine. spyera

Swaran Ravindra

Well, for starters, what I would like to see because we represent the Pacific Islands at a very preliminary level, I feel that I mean what what the who has in terms of classification, it, it is not? It is it's not probably the best tool for an average family who may have a disabled child. What we really need is a very quick access tool to be able to say okay, my child has certain symptoms or certain difficulties, certain challenges and just through going through a website, we should be able to, at least at a very basic level, try to understand as a parent, as a teacher, what issues a child face and because we do not have sufficient medical assistance here we do not have enough psychologists and psychiatrists either and people working in the disability area as well. So there's a range of disability that's needed to meet to be supported. What I'm really trying to do is find out what is the least supported impairment or disability so to speak, please feel free to correct my terms. I am still quite new to this year. So I am trying to find out what the least supported disability would be and create some sort of an assistance for that, for example, an inclusive chair that is that has a very sustainable approach. Because in the Pacific Islands we really cannot demand for example, even though Stephen Hawking's Professor Stephen Hawking's was my mentor, but I believe so. So I completely admire him but I do realize we are quite far from the technology at the moment but I would like to attempt to some people that's

okay. Yeah, I think that your point areas with in in some countries like the Pacific Island countries and in the Global South. There, those very expensive tools are not appropriate and it's a matter of having

appropriate tools and and considering that in some of our work, so thank you very much as well and for that, okay. Now, I realize that chindi isn't with us because of of timetabling issues. So we probably should have someone taking minutes. It says someone

And they'll and they'll find it, you know what I mean without having to, you know, so rather than, you know, rather than having to interpret, you know, a whole bunch of text, if one can be clear within the meeting, when you're saying, okay, summary of what was just said, you see what I mean? So the word summary may be and action item are the ones that are the key ones that we should use. When we want something to go in the minutes to say we want something that's a

You could actually go into notes and add a note or comment overlay on so that you can easily find it.

That's that's delving too deep but basically Okay, so you know if we have a phrase like for the minutes then or action items, so that so that when it's easy to go through it and find out what it is.

Gunela Astbrink

Okay, I think that's a great idea jolly and I think between you and I we we will remind anyone for each other, if there is something that should be an action item or a summary. So thank you for that. Well, Julie, would you like to introduce yourself please?

Joly MacFie

Um, my background is in punk rock. And, and, you know, which some of you may have heard of and, and so this was a thing that was came with a technology partly that was similar to the internet in the

70s, which was that just printing got very cheap. And suddenly you could also duplicate cassettes. And so it was the birth of peer to peer even before the internet. And I was like, an I was the printer in punk rock and I made millions and millions of badges, the punk rockers work. I also printed fanzines which people passed around so it was all about peer to peer. And so I realized very quickly that if we the same time as personal computers, if we could do this online, then we wouldn't have to, you know, cut down so many trees and, and all this kind of thing. And so um, so I actually moved to California where it was all happening. And, and then I found that the people who were into it were a bunch of hippies, they went into punk rock up in, you know, up in what became Silicon Valley. And I didn't get on with them and so I had to wait around maybe 13 years until the worldwide web became available. And then I started doing websites for bands. And then I started doing doing videos for bands. And then and then the dotcom boom thing. crash happened. And then I just kept doing videos. And eventually I got into sort of live streaming. And then I so I joined the Internet Society in 95. And in the New York chapter, and I became basically the administrator of New York chapter. In the early 2000s. And and began move and so I eventually moved over from shooting music after YouTube started. Then everybody was there with a with a phone camera. I stopped shooting music, and started shooting more tech because no one else was shooting that stuff. And, and so that led me eventually to live stream accessibility camp NYC. And I'm there and that was my real introduction to accessibility and I forget what year that was probably about 2014 or something or 13 or something was about seven years ago. And and then from that, I started like live streaming, all the accessibility New York meetups, their monthly meetups. And and so and at the same time, I'd been aware of the was a disability chapter within within ISOC and, and there was a very impressive woman Cynthia, what else who started it? Who was a pioneer in web accessibility in the in the 90s. And so I can't and she unfortunately died. So, eventually, this led me to and then, you know, I found other people that were sympathetic on on the topic. IE, Judith, and also Glen McKnight, who seems to have dropped off now that was also involved. But so we just we decided to try and revive the the disability chapter and in fact form it into the into a special interest group. And so that was really where the special interest group came from. And I started having monthly calls. And, and that's not kind of where we ended up now. I'm still live streaming the accessibility and why see, and also for the last year and a half or two, one of the guys in there moved to Tokyo and started running an accessibility Virtual Reality group which is quite an interesting topic, which is, you know, that virtual reality gives possibilities to people that don't have mobility or are otherwise you know, disabled to actually interact in a in a different fashion. You know, and transcend. disability. So and, you know, and there's lots of interesting even to virtual white canes for people who are blind to go around in virtual spaces, and this kind of thing, but it's still there's a lot of development there. And the one thing I've mentioned that just came from my streaming is last week, I streamed this with this

event. And in there, the guy from Brazil, Flavio, you know, promoted his campaign which is to add an 18th, STG accessibility for all and I wonder if that's a campaign that we should get behind as a group.

Okay, well, I think that should be noted for the Secretary. Thank you. All right. And I just wanted to add that Joly is admin extraordinaire. That's just goes without saying thank you jelly. Okay, that's gone. Okay. Yep. Vashkar Could you introduce yourself? Okay.

Vashkar Bhattacharjee

So Hello, all. In my place is around 530. Maybe 530 like that. pm. My name is Oscar Bhattacharjee. I'm a passive visual disability fully blind. Even I can't I don't have the night perceptional so since but I have gone blind. So my total journey was a full of a struggle. Even though I have started my studies in in a mini streaming is NATO was impossible for me to get education there and I have thrown in a specialist school. There was no books and technology or level of love. And after that, I have just completed my secondary certification exam. Not as a regular student, I just given exam as a private is called Private that means you do not not need to go to the school. So that was a struggle. And it was a struggle when I was trying to enter in the university. Then just went to a training in Japan and my life was changed. I just first time I have learned about the technology. last 20 years I'm solving for my country for making inclusive, barrier free digital Bangladesh and I was working with the Prime Minister of Bangladesh and consultant accessibility Currently I'm working with the Community Foundation and ICT on something and also I visited many non government organization and ordination of associate stable such as young power instructional extra Micha. I'm representing GT ICT, I'm country representative of GT ICT, which is an international organizations working to promote the inclusive ICT international level. I'm also the Vice President of the gates global alliance of accessible technology. And I was one of the internet internet society, internet governance fellow input purchase 2017. I was awarded by UNESCO and diverse got the and also Prime Minister of Bangladesh and I was innovated multimedia Talking Book accessible dictionary. And I'm currently working to promote the inclusive university in University of Chittagong. And now I'm working to launch a disability Innovation Lab which will be launched in December 2022. Um, so my dream is to work for more inclusive Internet now as persons with disabilities every day and facing difficulties for accessing internet and because of the accessibility if Internet Society accessibility standards group, we need to identify some of our specific target not only for internet society based on Internet Governance. For our sector, we need to think country level accessibility also I want to invest my time for digital accessibility accessibility materials, wave accessibility, and service accessibility and policy level intervention. And so I am working late on those issues. Um, so I guess I first got into accessibility probably sometime in 2013. When I think I heard I talked by Andrea sacks at some of the US State Department events that I've gone to, and she talked about accessibility issues and and captioning and others. And I like I had known about the i i

didn't come as came more active I had known about as jolly mentioned, we were working in the early 2000s with the old SS availity Work Group, which was a chapter that she had started with it was to a global chapter are based in North America. And I was on there but it wasn't really at that time. It was really active because the Cynthia had done passed away and the the other leaders were just too busy with work to get any to get to do any anything on that chapter. So it was trying to function with it took a lot of efforts by jolly myself to get it to be active. First what we had to do, we had to we couldn't create our own chapter until we got the blessings of the other book to kill the to kill their version. Awesome pass on mantle to us, which was difficult because no one was really active then. But we got it done. And we started and then we had to start up on chat on SIG and then we finally got it going and doing well. When we had the issues with I saw that led to the forming of this group. So I've been working on accessibility for a while trying to make other platforms more accessible, trying to make sure that as human captioning, trying to always advocate for on accessibility issues throughout. And, you know, working as we've been trying with ISOC for so many years, as you can now look and testify to to try to get it more accessible. We've had a lot more success in ICANN and getting things accessible and we we work to get other platforms accessible and other areas and they seem to be more willing to do it but again it was also a while they are willing, it's also another process they are not none of these people are willing to have a person on staff and you can push but they don't. People are just not don't do not produce accessible documents. And then is always gone after the fact of trying to make them more accessible. So I guess that's my little pitch. Thank you still work on accessibility on many on the in the US part on on definite trying to get resolutions will accessible and other areas as well.

Okay. Well, I thank you very much Judas. You your voices heard in in very many places. So yeah, that's great. Now Zakari would. Would you like to introduce yourself I know you've you've written you've written some, some really good background, but just briefly, please go ahead.

Zakari Yama

Thank you that you're gonna love for giving me the opportunity to introduce myself to be very brief. I am a digital transformation program manager with a long experience in different industries. I am also a former web designer. A I became a member of Isaac to the 2019 and a un un two accessibility special interest group and two in 2020. After a personal experience with a temporary disability I decided to to do my best to contribute to build an accessible when for all as you know the need for digital accessibility for persons with disabilities is greatest in developing countries where many basic rights are not respected. People with the disabilities are completely left behind when it comes to digital services. So I believe that the web accessibility is a matter of social justice. The same way all the children on Earth have a right to education and we all have the right to information and healthcare. The same way people people must have the right of an equal right to digital services and knowing that everyone will experience a kind of disability in his lifetime, it becomes a matter of, of general interest it is in the best interest of for the whole society to make the web accessible for persons with disabilities. So I'm here to bring my contribution to achieve this goal. And thank you, thank you very much. I I sent I sent you some some point that can be discussed. Maybe we can go deeply in this point next time or on on chatting platform. A I have a suggestion to that I can add to this point in the the objective of building our action plan.

If they can make their platform accessible? This is one. Secondly, email based communication is more mostly helpful as it is any if anything is very urgent or important, please send me a mail which is better for me. And other things are okay. Do me is perfectly alright for meeting. So, so Okay. Thank you.

Joly MacFie

Do you have a preferred chat application but there isn't WhatsApp.

Vashkar Bhattacharjee

I think messenger is a perfect

Joly MacFie messenger. Yeah.

Vashkar Bhattacharjee

Yes, that is accessible. Another what else? Escape is okay. Which one? Escape escape?

Judith Hellerstein

Skype. Yeah, Skype is not a strategy. It's very difficult. To find any messages in Skype.

Vashkar Bhattacharjee

We have, we have we have some is called scripting. For our software. We have developed some scripting. Read the Skype message. So messenger is more mostly convenient. I think we don't need any script or anything. For escape we need some scripting for the screen reading software. What are some communication is okay but fire never do you send any laying or need to fill up anything.

For those of us that are here then does anybody object to Facebook Messenger. Well,

I don't use Facebook at all. Facebook,

Vashkar Bhattacharjee

it I don't want to I don't want to ship to you. From WhatsApp. You must you can we can use your service. Okay. But for anything which I need to fill up by using browser, like any form or any, any types of things so that in that case, you can send it to my email. Yeah, you got the message communication is okay, I can read the message. I can send a message that is all right. But when ever there is something I need to go to the browser for filler for see the information better to send it by email. If you think it is very important.

Joly MacFie

Okay no to

Vashkar Bhattacharjee

so we can we can continue our communication through WhatsApp.

Joly MacFie

Okay. I'll just say that, you know, in in the conversation with Kyle, he was suggesting, you know, that connect should be the main avenue for sort of documentation and for two years and, and so you know, as for email, it doesn't it works fairly well. But you know, you as long as you've got your email switched on and connect, you can just reply to an email threads, okay. And so it's okay as as as a kind of, as a forum to, to do email back and forward. But for documentation. Now. I just this, just this week had to do the documentation for the threats to the internet event that happened last week. They wanted me to post it, you know, it's not public. It's just inside chapter leaders. So I posted it on on Connect, you know, with with video, and what I found was when I tried to upload subtitles for the video, it wouldn't even accept the subtitle files. It's not, they won't take SRT, VTT files, and let alone show demonstrate them, you know, overlay them on a video or whatever. So, you know, I know that they're not if I say to them about it, they'll just say, well, we're going to move to a new platform or something. But so it seriously for for rich media documentation. It is just totally insufficient is what I is what I found I already I already you know, mentioned this so it's it's an it was it was surprising to me because I just hadn't actually posted any rich media, you know, there's what you have is within the group, you have, you know, you don't just have a discussion. You also have a blog, and you also have a library, so I was using the library. No, what you can do is you can embed YouTube on there. So as you know, so the only problem with this

thing was they didn't want it to be public. So, you know, it's like could have embedded embedded YouTube's rather than posted the files, but I wanted to make the files downloadable. But you know, my solution was to zip the the, the caption file so you could download the video and down, download the zip with the caption files, unzip it, and then you would still be able to watch it offline with captions that Yeah, there's definitely work to do there. The other thing is that, you know, you never mentioned the wiki so the wiki is is not the sanding group. It is the accessibility said, but we're happy to make it available to to the standing group for any purpose. And I would think that I would, if they have, you know, make sure that Swaran and Zachary have accounts on the wiki so that they can use it as a workspace to to do you know, I think it's the best idea and it's and we know that that we know that the wiki is accessible and and can work in that fashion. So this is something we can follow up after the call on setting up you know, pages for planning and stuff on the wiki.

Gunela Astbrink

Chapter delegates so did you get that message from Christine today? Yes, yesterday. Oh, you must you must be on yesterday. You must be on Chapter delegates.

Judith Hellerstein

Right? Well, I'm chapter delegates because Kyle Manley added us all in. Yes he did. But to get on the chapter community we have to manually added in and I'm not sure that was done but anyway.

Joly MacFie

So you can put that as an action item. Jolly to check if we're on the Connect.

Gunela Astbrink

Secretary action item dolly is going to crack about Connect which app to get the tickets thanks.

Judith Hellerstein

Yeah, I am not. I hate I don't like connect. It's very difficult to write to. I find it difficult to use and it's extremely difficult to attach things. You have to log on to Chapter delegates and to connect to actually attach things. You can't attach things through email. It's very a difficult procedure. It's not intuitive. It's just not good. i When the crowd who dislikes connect, um, as is many of the ISOC people. Leaders. My question also is Ali I know well, we're not going to be a point to a Kyle said we are not going to be um I stopped is going to be registering all people for zoom thing so we're not going to be needing the accessible forms. That we use and accessibility SIG for registering jollies

Joly MacFie

Excuse me a second Judas. I've just got to there's another ISOC event starting that I've got to record so I'm just going to step away just for a minute.

Judith Hellerstein

Okay. Okay.

Gunela Astbrink

All right. Fine. Yes. So I, I had I had another question for Joly, which are just hold for now. But just to summarize, for the Secretary, that according baska has told us that WhatsApp is not good for links for him. It can be used for, for for general messages. So we need to be aware of it. For for posting important information, including links, email is preferred. So we need to do that. And I should also say with the wiki mentioned we probably didn't make it clear to just fire on Zaccaria investiga. That the ISOC accessibility SIG is, is is a sort of predecessor of a standing group, but it is now still operational, but working and the New York chapter and, and the New York chapter is is generally supporting the accessibility SIG through the Fiscal Sponsorship. So there is some some funding that potentially could support the standing group if that happened, and because Joly is involved with the New York chapter with the accessibility CME Group, and you Yes, of course and me as well. I'm, I'm still the the vice president of a cig. So the various there is a quite an interconnected and so with a wiki event, Jolly mentioned, that's set up for the SIG and the standing group can use it and Bershka I just wanted

to check with you if you are comfortable using the wiki if if we need to work on any any particular activity or whatever

Vashkar Bhattacharjee

I need to check it how it is. I think I didn't that I didn't use it

Gunela Astbrink

before. No, no, that's perfectly fine. Oh,

Judith Hellerstein

and also gonna do that. There is we also need to make also make sure that some parts of zoom are non accessible. So while we had tested while people can everyone could use the polls and the surveys that you do in a Zoom meeting, those are set to go. We have to manually if you ever do that we have to announce the results because the result page is not accessible.

Gunela Astbrink

Yes. Okay.

Judith Hellerstein

So we tested out with with the BIA.

Gunela Astbrink

Okay, that's that's good to know, too. So that's a note for the Secretary as well.

Judith Hellerstein

Yes. And also note is we also welcome on the accessibility sick we also welcome everyone to join that. It is a global group. It is not just for ice North America. Oh, I suck me up. It's a global group we just happen to be housed with as a project of Isaac New York, but it's a total global group.

Gunela Astbrink

That's correct. And Zakari initially joined the accessibility SIG and and then Vice members moved across, if I wish to, of course to the standing group. So yes, so so that that's definitely global as well. Okay, Johnny, you're back. I just want to

Joly MacFie

just say on that topic was that it used to be that if you joined one you will automatically add to be joined the other so that probably is no longer the case. Especially as you know, ISOC is not going to share with us. And we can write we can offer invite people via the VIA Connect to join the accessibility sector. At the moment, the men the the memberships are no longer aligned synchronously as they were.

Gunela Astbrink

Yes, yes, unfortunately. And, and I mean, you had collected a lot of very useful information about the SIG membership, which we won't have future access to under the standing group, as I understand,

Joly MacFie

oh, you know, yeah, we can we can still ask people to fill out the form we can still have them register. You know, that's a good reason. There is a good reason for people to register because then we do get information that is our registration form is quite granular. You know, about you know, what experience people have with accessibility and and their involvement, you know, whether they have disabilities and their involvement in the past.

Gunela Astbrink

Exactly. And that is really useful as we start or activities and projects to see if our particular members in particular regions or whatever, who can help us support us whatever in the work going forward. So, yeah, okay. I wanted to ask you Joly about the vet listserv, if that's what it is, for the standing group leaders because I noticed there was a message from another ISOC staff member coming in and I was a little bit surprised to see that. So

Joly MacFie

I you know, I requested that the list could be anybody could email that was one of the things was, I was asking asking for an alias rather than a list. You know, that. So, you know, so that if we could say, Okay, if you if you want to contact us, here is an email where you can come that you can contact all of us. So if anybody wants to message the leadership of the group, you know, so rather than being a discussion group amongst ourselves, but it'd be an email that one can use one single email to address the entire leadership of the group. So it should be that anybody and I believe that the person that emailed was an IT person that had been tasked with setting up the group, we just wanted to see if it was working. And that, you know, I didn't set that up. That is an ISOC thing that Kyle tried to set it up using his own Microsoft stuff and it didn't work. So he then had to go to it, I think, and that was the IT person who's who set it up. I might be wrong, but that's what I surmised.

Gunela Astbrink

Yes, that that person, his name is David Frenchy. And He is the senior director for European government and regulatory affairs. So he's not necessarily an IC

Joly MacFie

Yes. And you're not just webcast him last week on the eyes. You know, he was on the internet threats calls by now maybe wasn't

Gunela Astbrink

right. And and so he he emailed the leadership team, some very useful information. Yeah, I see it now. That's great. But so it's it wasn't a test. From the IT people but I, I just think we need to be aware of what that who can who can post to it and how it's to be used. So that's, that's my main

Joly MacFie

cause. I know anybody can pose to it. Right. And

Gunela Astbrink

I think the question then is, is that what we wish to have? Sure.

Joly MacFie

Yeah. All right, that you can ask that but it's what I asked for.

Gunela Astbrink

Yeah. And Is that Is that enough for us? Do we? Do we need another one just for our leadership team, as we're working through so the action plan and how are we best to communicate when we are developing the action plan? So I'm just thinking, do we do that? Just with an alias or, or what?

Joly MacFie

I think I think that this, this works for both, you know, I don't see that. There's a problem there that if we want to talk to us, you know, I don't know which you know, if we prefer to talk on the WhatsApp or on or on this. It doesn't make a lot of difference. You know, because we're both on we're all on each of them. Vashkar said that he finds finds email easier to deal with. But it's only I think he's all right with with WhatsApp for conversation, but he finds if he has to hit links to web pages, he prefers it because he prefers email. I'm suggesting that we basically use use use the wiki for talk for you know, for building doc and we can also use obviously Google Documents, there's no reason not to, if that if that's what you know, and it's down to us to swear and and Zachary is to really decide how they want to work. You know, we there's no need for us to impose on my way of working. They can work with whatever works for them. As far as that kind of thing goes.

Gunela Astbrink

Okay. So Carrie, you've got your hand up. Unmute unmute. Unmute. Could you unmute yourself place?

Zakari Yama

Sorry. I have just a question for Joly. Does the wiki support charts and tables? And can we have is it possible to have a Restricted Section in the weekend a wiki for just the leadership group, the leadership team?

Joly MacFie

I believe we probably be better off going with Google Docs for that just because it's a lot easier. It's less you know, so if you guys want to use Google Docs Feel free. Okay,

Gunela Astbrink

okay. Thank you. Thank you. And Vaska Are you comfortable with using Google Docs?

Vashkar Bhattacharjee

Yeah, I think so. It is okay. And also the WhatsApp base communication is all right for me. Except if I need to fill up any form or read any materials in online like in by clicking the link then you can send me email, you know, in my mobile as as as desktop version of the worst service not accessible, so I need to use my Android phone for reading the links and fill up the thing so it's little bit difficult for me. So Google Docs is okay.

Joly MacFie

So what I'll say is, well, you know, you might want to restrict it so that we talk amongst ourselves, um, you know, the sort of real thought behind the wiki is is really transparency to document transparently, you know, our processes as as as we go along, you know, not a not keep it between ourselves. So, you know, so it's just a question of if something is good enough is, is, if we don't want to show it to people, we should consciously say, Okay, this isn't public, but if it doesn't, if there's no good reason, like even this call today, the recording will be available on the wiki under the normal course of things as with anything, you know, because we, we, you know, have nothing to hide at the same time we should be aware of the fact that we shouldn't say bad things about people because we are a public want to do, except for people who aren't, who don't have accessible websites, etc. In which case we can say nasty things as much as we like

Gunela Astbrink

salutely. Okay. All right. So we need to then make make a decision as to that and again, for the Secretary, the action items, I think we've covered off using WhatsApp before general general conversation discussion and but we've links to you to use email and and then we have the, that particular listserv for leaders, which is open. And we have we have access to the wiki, but we probably will concentrate as we develop the action plan to use Google Docs and we are awaiting licenses for zoom from Kyle, and we need to be aware that there would be if any polls taken as part of a zoom call that the results of a poll are spoken out. So

Judith Hellerstein

Gunela as an action note, also, is that for your communication team, that whole notice also need to be there. That ISOC if they do polls, on anything, needs to read out the results.

Gunela Astbrink

Sure, yeah. Yeah, that's, that's fine. But for now, basically,

Joly MacFie

the way I would put it, another is that Google Docs for working on the wiki for publishing. Okay, yep.

Gunela Astbrink

Sounds good. Okay, so, Secretary, that's for noting, okay, I think we've covered off Vaska Are you comfortable with how we've we're going to proceed with it.

Gunela Astbrink

Okay, good. All right. Let's move on. We have just on 15 minutes left and I wasn't expecting us to really be able to talk about statement of aims or action plans. It's just a matter of being aware that they are the key issues that we will be talking about at the next meeting. So we just need to cover off item five on the internet governance training project and very briefly talk about the ISOC content strategy, which should be quite brief because the notes are in the wiki. So one of the one of the areas that I've been very keen to work on is to train and mentor and support people with disability as emerging leaders in Internet governance. And and one of the groups I've been speaking to is the Asia Pacific School of internet governance and they are very interested in in doing something at the last APC big meeting, a biannual meeting. There was a person called Monique Gunaratna from Sri Lanka, who, who gave a

very good presentation and I also presented at that. So that was a stimulus for continuing on to do internet governance training for persons with disability and APC have a small amount of funds to run. Well, they need the final approval for the concept to run a small training workshop it has to be done before June and it will involve probably 10 to 15 people. Probably a large number of them will be from South Asia. This is a pilot project and just to to get the ball rolling. This is opportunities if funding is available to do a lot more after June and what APC has asked me is, if it's possible, to get approval from the leadership team to be a potential partner, basically in this training and it doesn't require any financial support even though they would be very keen on that. It's basically in principle support. So that then when they go to their funder, they can say, well, the ISOC accessibility standing group is is a partner or supporting this, this particular pilot project. So Judah if you've got your hand up,

Judith Hellerstein

yes. Thanks for that. That's a great project. And I'm also wondering, maybe we want to also talk to Glenn McKnight and Alfredo Calderon about putting this in the virtual Internet governance classes they teach they are always looking for content. And so he's always looking for ideas of what classes to teach or what other stuff to put in their virtual cohorts. And so maybe something training on internet governance on accessibility, like teaching about accessible documents or other accessibility we could have try get a component and in that in that section as well.

Gunela Astbrink

Yeah, which so

Judith Hellerstein

Fenwick Knight, and Alfredo, one is a school of internet Virtual School of internet governance. They've been doing lots and lots of training on intimate governance to everyone. Yes. So if we're training about internet governance, we can train in that area and try to get the module made and jolly has a actual hand up, as opposed to a virtual hand up.

Gunela Astbrink

Go for it, Joly.

Joly MacFie

Um, I know I would say that, you know, the virtual thing is just one amongst many six schools of internet governance. What I noticed that there is a meeting of the dynamic Coalition on schools of internet governance coming up in just about an hour and a half now. I wondered if any of us were going thinking of attending that to speak up for accessibility? Judith?

Judith Hellerstein

I wasn't planning on attending. Um, I have another session to go to. The dynamic coalition saw meeting

Joly MacFie

and I'm now on their mailing list and

Judith Hellerstein

and jet jelly, put some comments in. I just want to make sure those get mentioned in the deck in that meeting, because you know that that group as I wrote, back to jelly is not has no real funding. And so we can't ask them to go have separate meetings with different groups because they have no funding. They're all volunteers. Unlike other ones, they have a paid staff. So

Joly MacFie

this dynamic coalition,

Judith Hellerstein

right, this is the only chance so that's why I can't go to the other thing, because it's happening follow yet, same time.

Joly MacFie

Okay. And then my question is about the APC training, so of expecting us to actually supply expertise and trainers or just it's just moral support.

Gunela Astbrink

It's it's more more or less moral support. And, and I will

Joly MacFie

one thing that we that we, you know, which I owe, I'm happy to offer is that we have such a thing were to happen we'd be very happy to like, record a live stream there's so there's it could be be a resource for for other groups.

Gunela Astbrink

Yeah. Thank you. Now that sounds good. And I I've been making a few suggestions. It's it's still, it's still the concepts are being developed like it could be a train the trainer workshop, like three days in one particular place. It could be more where you have some webinars to start with, and I've suggested using some of the accessibility SIG webinars and the accessibility toolkit and and then having a few online discussions about that before the three day meeting, and and the three day meeting would possibly look at case studies where the participants could discuss particular issues in their country and use information material. It's all it's all under

Joly MacFie

topic with the topic, specifically be accessibility in Internet governance, or would it be more generally accessibility in? Well,

Gunela Astbrink

it would be with internet governance as a basis. But it would be talking about accessibility and it and and then saying, okay, the ecosystem, comprises i can i sock, IGF, et cetera, et cetera. And there's these, these things going on here and here. And, and, and it's going to be very hard to do this in a very condensed form in a very brief time. We have a very short short lead up. And

Joly MacFie

this is very interesting to see what they come up with.

Gunela Astbrink

Yeah, and and this is this is a constraints that APC is working on and I'm I'm I'm, you know, I'm fairly involved with it, whereas it's, it's up to the APC executive committee, and I'm providing information and ideas to them, so I needed to know I needed to state that as well. And suoraan you had a question? Is this the same as the ISOC IG training? And I said no, because that that is quite separate and it doesn't necessarily involve any accessibility component or any focus on disability at this stage, but that is something that we as sustaining group can encourage into the future. So it's, there's very many balls up in the air I've been talking to a Diplo foundation as well, about possible training in Internet governance, for persons with disability all these balls are up in the air at the moment, and it's a matter of how they land and where they land. So this is this is really I suppose the first step is, is if if we as the leadership team, prepared to, as Charlie says, offer moral support to to AAPC to help them with with Symantec is funding.

Joly MacFie

So can we have a vote? By vote aye. And how about the

Judith Hellerstein

others? Yes.

Gunela Astbrink

Thank you. So carry as far on Thank you very much. investiga.

Zakari Yama

Yeah, hello.

Joly MacFie

Yes. But it be noted as unanimous. Yeah.

Gunela Astbrink

Okay, so Secretary, that voted unanimous, thank you very much, and I'll pass it on to APC leadership and and the and vasca Satish Babu is the chair of the APC, executive committee for your information. Okay, so very briefly, just about the ISOC content strategy. It's posted in the wiki I send something around to us all about that. Also to Community Connect. So I just wanted to flag that this is happening. There. There's a lot that the, the internal working group in ISOGG will have to understand about accessibility is one thing talking about in principle, and other thing, actually walking the talk, so to speak, and one of the things is, yeah, in a second jolly. One of the things is that Andre capulin, the head of systems and support have suggested to Vasco an AI to use Slack to to collaborate and, and I made the point well, you know, I you sure it's accessible and, and so the then Andre said, Well, you know, vasca can join and then and give his feedback about accessibility. So it's, it's, it's that old mindset that, you know, you just, you have a blind person and the blind person can say, Oh, yes, it's accessible or not. It's so much more involved than that. Also, bearing in mind there it's a metaphor for both Vasco and I and, and any others who wish to join this work from the leadership team to learn Slack. So, yeah, so that's where we're up to and Judith, I've noticed that you previously talked about registration forms for any ISOC events, asking for accessibility needs. So so that's something we certainly would raise. Judith. You. You have

Judith Hellerstein

Yeah, so my other point I had was that I think also we need to raise in there about accessible documents. Um, my Big Beef is, people don't not put all texts for the scribing of the images. They copy tables, and paste into documents document. And now those come out as images. PowerPoint has to be described everything and we could get Greg has offered to give a class on that. If you want him to give a class on that on accessible documents and PowerPoints and other stuff, because that's a big issue. And no one is doing that. Also, when you save documents, people sometimes save to print and then that doesn't do accessible features. So anything else on social media, everything that needs to be trained for them because they don't know and they continue people continue to do stuff that is not accessible.

Gunela Astbrink

Yep, that Yep. And and James would talk about that they are they've got this training as part of a content strategy, which includes a specific component on accessibility and inclusion, and he offered to send that to us to review and, and so we'll have to check that out. But we can also offer offer Greg shaytans plus on that, so yeah, okay, thank you for that. And Joey you're

Joly MacFie

unmuted. Yeah. Um, I will say that you know, the feedback which we've consistently given them, which is you sort of referred to it there is that they should use, you know, professionals to review their websites and projects rather than just, you know, sending it to us and saying, Would you take a look at it, because the, you know, it's not just an amateur thing, you need people who really know how to do, how to do this kind of thing. And I've recommended them to one company, who I'm come familiar with, you know, that hire disabled people. To do the testing, but, you know, do it in a coordinated fashion. So, you know, hopefully they seem to take taken that that message to heart. And I had something else which was inspired by what you were talking about, which I've completely forgotten now.

Gunela Astbrink

Okay, that's fine. Um, yeah. So I think the VA for the Secretary of the VA item to be noted is to a way,

remember, okay, go ahead, but I've remembered what

Gunela Astbrink

Okay, to a way to the, the training component for staff on accessible content, and give feedback on that and, if necessary, offer Greg's class. That's assuming he will be happy to do that on accessible documents and PowerPoints, etc. So yeah, okay. Jolly. freeform, the

topic of slack I think has a slack and I'm on it so I can immediately start over you know, start conversing with them on their way if we want to use that as a venue. I saw can why has a Slack where which we could also I had a minute and we could, if we wanted to set up channels on there to mess around that would be quite to do. And then also, there is actually a very good accessibility slack, where, you know, everybody's on which we could open up our own channel on it if we so wished, you know, so, so there's, you know, and as far as I know, Slack actually is pretty accessible. We we could have the standing you know, standing group, put input into the accessibility sic outstanding webinars, not just say for suoraan and Zakari. What this is, is that the accessibility say got money last year to run webinars, and but hasn't got around to running those webinars. So we have an outstanding series of webinars to to do where we've got money for transcription and this kind of thing on running those which there is in fact or WhatsApp channel. Planning for planning those which nothing as much as materialized yet. And provare. D is it is all

So I think that's important to look at and also the rest of it, just to get a sense of how ISOC are looking at the standing groups working and we can then bring back to the next the next meeting. In the meantime, of course, we can have any, any discussion online, but we might need to be tweaking some of those roles a little bit. And especially with Swaran and sahkari. Sharing that role. We need to see how how you two can best work together. So I think that that would be really important to talk about next time. So are we comfortable?
